Why Revise?

Practice makes progress

- English Language tests skills, not facts. These skills take time to develop
- Timings are important all students make errors with this initially
- Knowing WHAT the question is assessing is important



Confidence boost

- Builds stamina especially for the higher mark questions
- Working consistently on questions reduces overall stress
- Part of the learning process involves making mistakes. Completing practice questions will help to go through this process.

19th –20th Century texts



- Read widely across 19th, 20th and 21st century fiction and non-fiction
- Summarise and synthesise ideas in your own words to consolidate understanding
- As you are reading spot particular language and structural features used by writers
- Learn command words (compare, evaluate, to what extent) to shape your response
- Read quality newspapers and watch documentaries to broaden your knowledge

Building Writing skills (Section B of exams)

TRANSACTIONAL WRITING



- Vocabulary is important throughout all of the questions
- Accurate spelling, punctuation and grammar is important (SPaG)
- Vary sentence structures and punctuation for impact
- Use vivid imagery and senses (similes, metaphors, personification) for creative responses
- Have a clear viewpoint/argument for transactional writing (paper 2)
- Use rhetorical devices such as statistics, emotive language, rhetorical questions and alliteration (DAFOREST/AFOREST PIE and others...) to support arguments in transactional writing

WHAT to revise?

What each question is asking you to do

What the timing for each question is (don't run out of time on the higher mark questions)

Build your vocabulary

Ensure you know how to use a range of punctuation.

Key vocabulary associated with key images (dual-coding)

Read ANY text and spot key language and structural aspects

Practice inference skills by selecting quotations and exploring what they make you think, feel or imagine.

Plan story openings

Plan descriptive writing

Online quizzes – SENECA

Mini mind maps for the different questions of the exam

Practise writing under timed conditions and manage your time

Ask teachers to review work and ACT on advise/feedback

Don't avoid the questions you might struggle the most with (P1, Q4 & P2, Q4)
