Battlefields History Trip

On Wednesday 29th November, forty-eight of our Year 9 and 10 Historians departed school at 3.30am for the World War One battlefields. Following a lengthy but uneventful coach journey, all of the students found themselves standing in a British cemetery outside Ypres in Belgium. Over 80% of the graves here were of soldiers whose identities were unknown. There can be no more powerful way of teaching the horror of war than to reflect on its impact on individuals. The men buried in these graves had once had lives and families that were ripped away from them in the maelstrom of conflict. Each grave had probably never been visited before, as no relative would know that their son or husband now lay there. We therefore marked the start of this trip by paying the unknown individuals buried beneath us the respect that they deserved.

On the second day of the trip, we travelled to Vimy Ridge, and then onto the Somme in France. Here the trench lines are still evident across the landscape. We walked out from the remnants of the British front line across 'no-man's land', hearing the stories of the first day of the battle- the worst day in British military history- when whole communities of young men were wiped out. We paid our respects at the Thiepval memorial, and many students were

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struck by how often they found their own surnames on the lists of combatants whose bodies were never found.

Following two days of considerable coach time, we focused our third day in Ypres, the salient where so much fighting took place between 1914 and 1918. Here we visited both British and German cemeteries, went down into some extremely wet trench lines, and toured museums that spoke of the different battles. The day ended with the memorial service at the Menin Gate, where our students were outstanding in their respect and engagement, standing out in the cold for well over an hour to witness a moment that has taken place every evening for almost a century.

Trips like this can be a very full-on experience for everybody involved. However, Saturday morning acted as a bit of light relief as we visited the Christmas market and chocolate shops. Mr Hansen had been learning Flemish, and so all the students were taught key phrases to use on an incredulous but patient group of stall holders. Having purchased more sugar than an average human could eat in a year, we slumped onto the coach for the journey home. Mr Hollis had utterly failed to bring any DVDs that anybody wanted to watch, but most students (and staff!) happily plugged themselves into their various mobile devices, dozing their way back to Thirsk. We always talk about how outstanding our students are on trips, but this did seem to bring out the very best in all of those that came with us. It was a pleasure to take such an attentive, respectful, and interested group of young people on such an important trip. Mr Hollis
